




The World Is Too Much With Us





The Solution

"Prayer heals, especially when practiced at 5.5 breaths a minute" (84).



History

Formulation:


- Originates in the 5th Century. Documented in a letter from John Chrysostom.
- Common practice among the Desert Fathers / Ascetic monastic movement
- Philippians 2:11 (Jesus Christ is Lord) Luke 1:35 (Son of God) Luke 18:23 (God be merciful to me a sinner) / Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector



Observations

- The Jesus Prayer names the identity of our Maker. It names our identity / need apart from Him.
- It acknowledges the reality of our sin as a vital first step toward reconciliation with God and with one another.
- Contemplation leads to repentance. "Search me, O God, and know my heart. Try me and know my thoughts. See if there be any grievous way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." - Psalm 139:23-24
- It appeals to God's boundless mercy.

God's native language is silence, the church fathers say. Silence is God's voice and that voice says, "I love you, I love you, I love you." For silence is the space that God has made within his Being for us to be. This is love: to let the other be, to open a space within self for other. Silence is that space within God's being where we are able to be. So, when we hear silence, we are listening to God tell us that he loves us enough to make room within himself for us.

We have construed silence as God's absence, disappearance, or indifference, and we have done so because we are idolatrous: we have made God in our image – we who constantly speak in order to assert ourselves. We have thought of God in human terms: when we want to assert ourselves, when we want to make ourselves known, we speak. We fill up the silence with our own words; we impose our voice on the other. We fill up the silence that gave the other space to be.

God is not like us: he does not disclose himself at the expense of the other. Rather, his selfdisclosure is an act of love, an act that lets the other be other. He discloses himself to us in the very act of giving us being. When he makes space, or silence, when he makes a place for us, this is his voice speaking love over us.

I love the silence, for in it I hear God repeat his love over me.
